IAP2 Australasia Annual Report 2009-2010

President's Report

Anne Pattillo

Margaret Mead said that "A small group of thoughtful people could change the world. Indeed, it's the only thing that ever has." When I reflect on this year the IAP2 Australasian Committee and the team of Regional Coordinators have been working hard to change the world and I'd say in the last year we have started to give the world a little bump. There have been a number of significant developments in the year.

New strategic plan

The committee and the Regional Coordinators' key focus this year was dreaming about the future and they developed a revised strategy plan for the Association. The key points for the development of the Association are:

- Developing and supporting a vibrant and dynamic membership community
- Advancing the practice of community engagement
- Leading the integration and embedding of public participation practice

Membership and membership activity

Well it has been another year of record growth. In this year our membership has grown 28% from 558 at the beginning of the period to 715 at the end of June. The biggest membership growth has been in Victoria. Our membership growth has also been reflected in the growth in the number of events and the level of participation in the local membership events. In the last year over 1200 people have participated in our local and regional events and over 400 people participated in the certificate training and public workshops.

This year's conference was a blast

The Western Australian team hosted a fantastic conference with over 170 participants themed around Tackling the Tough Issues – Engaging for Results. The conference was creative and highlighted the best of practice in engagement and learning. Highlights included opening of the conference by the Western Australian Governor, the use of "second life" as a learning and engagement format and the picnic circles on the Esplanade that conference attendees gathered around the issues and topics that interested them most.

We contracted our first Executive Officer

A major development this year has been the introduction of a part time Executive Officer, Heather Barton. With Heather's vision and ability to take a dream and find a way to make it possible we have been able to extend our relationship with sponsors and with our corporate members. This year we changed our administrative team responsible for providing support to our volunteers and to creating an administrative backbone. The team has added an edge to our work and after we realised the full implications of the event and membership growth we have grown our administrative capacity a little.

Practice Development

An exciting development this year has been the real focus on practice development. Three major projects were initiated in this year. We completed another year of Core Values Awards, adding a research and learning scholarship to support practice lead research. We worked on a Core Values retrospective for the last five years and we will launch the retrospective at the 2010 AGM. We also commenced a State of the Practice project to create a regular process of review and evaluation of the state of public participation across the region. This world first was piloted in Victoria in March 2010.



Financially we have moved from strength to strength

Financially the Association has moved from strength to strength off the back of a very successful conference, great events, growing membership and a growing training service. The coming year provides the Association with the opportunity to invest in key systems and services to support the further development of the Association and support to our members and our practice.

IAP2 International moves to affiliate model world wide

This year has been big for IAP2 internationally with the decision to move to an affiliate model worldwide. Australasia hosted the international Board meeting in March when the board deliberated on this major decision in terms of our development as a global leader in engagement practice. Australasia did its bit to help in the international decision making by sharing as much information as possible about life as an affiliate with chapters across the world.

My thanks

None of these developments would be possible without the hard work dedication of the committee and the Regional Coordinators. My thanks to them all for your efforts, talents and inspiration. Special thanks to Kimbra White and Lucy Cole Edelstein for doing the hard leadership work on both the Affiliate and the International Board in this year of massive change for IAP2.

Thanks too, to Heather Barton and Lesley Ryall and her team who have turned imagination into reality with style, commitment and a fair degree of magic!

In this, my final year as IAP2 Australasian President, I want to extend my thanks and best wishes to all the members who have made this role the best ever volunteer role in the world. My thanks for the opportunity, it's been a privilege.

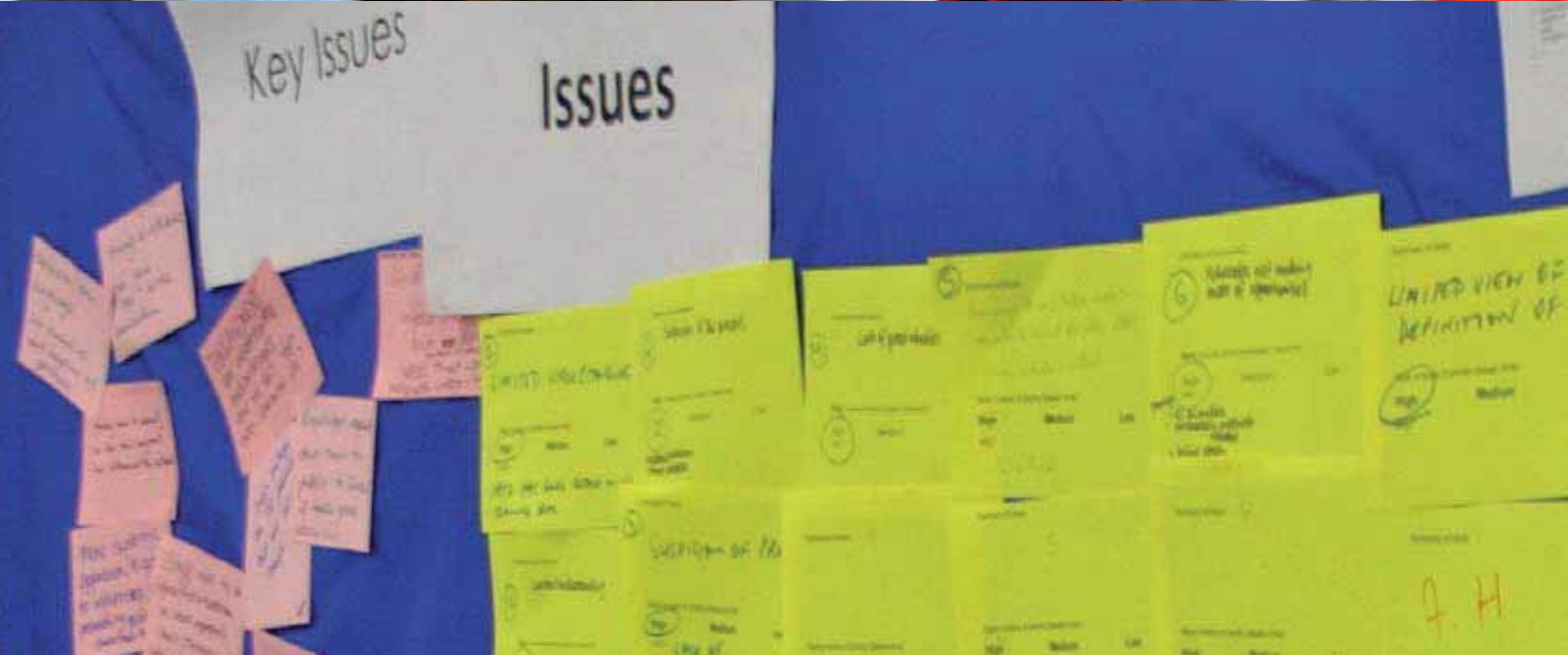

Shaping our Future – One Step at a Time



The Conference in Perth proved to be a great opportunity for a brand-new Executive Officer to start in a brand-new role. Together with Lesley Ryall, heading up the newly appointed Secretariat, we witnessed first-hand what is probably the organisation's greatest attribute - the energy and enthusiasm of people who care deeply about engaging people in the decision making that impacts their lives. We were warmly welcomed to the leadership team and caught their excitement in being at the threshold of something 'big' - planning a shared vision for the Association's future.

The Strategic Planning process, commenced in Perth, enabled the organisation to identify, set down and work towards achieving specific, desired results. And yet the results, as outlined by the President in her report, have been groundbreaking and set the organisation on new pathways for a strong future.

The Committee showed their commitment to this firm foundation for the future by allocating an additional resource in an Executive Officer. Some of the outcomes are

- Improved profiling and wider recognition of the IAP2 brand
- Stronger reputation of IAP2 as a 'can do' organisation with the capacity to deliver on strategic priorities and respond to opportunities
- New partnerships and emerging relationships resulting in financial benefit for IAP2 which, in turn, are ploughed back into the organisation's strategies, and improved outcomes in advancing the practice of public participation
- Improved sense of belonging through stronger relationships with current and potential corporate members
- Strong confident governance model, with improved clarity around responsibilities and accountabilities and greater understanding of the governance and management roles
- More robust structure, stronger decision making and improved support for volunteer leaders and members
- Confidence in ourselves as an organisation able to meet future challenges as an active, contributing stakeholder and affiliate member of the international body

Finally, thank you for welcoming me to this great organisation and a big thank you to the team of volunteer leaders who consistently demonstrate bold leadership, determination and strength – and the optimism and commitment to continue to move the Association forward; it is a joy to work with you. You are people who share your skills willingly and a considerable amount of your discretionary time for the good of the organisation, its members and its mission.

Together with Lesley and her team, we look forward to continuing to work together to enhance the progress of IAP2 Australasia and the practice of community engagement across New Zealand and Australia.

IAP2 International Board Report

This year has been one of the most significant for the International Board, as it wrestled with and resolved major issues relating to how it is structured.

The major challenge confronting the Board was the need to become a truly international association, with active membership being appropriately supported in multiple countries. The most effective way to implement this was through a Federation of Affiliates model, where each country or region creates an Affiliate structure, with representatives from each (depending on the size of the membership) on the International Board.

Currently, the only Affiliate is Australasia. The Board voted in March to move to the Federation of Affiliate model and this will become operational from January 1, 2011. Australasia has already submitted our application to join!

So what does this mean for members, particularly here in Australia? In some regards, not a lot. You will continue to be supported by the Australasian Affiliate, which currently manages all the IAP2 training and events we all enjoy. The Affiliate will need to nominate two representatives to sit on the International Board (currently Board members are elected). The International Board will focus on the development of training, policy and the promotion of public participation. Affiliates will manage members, delivery of training and, importantly, the local delivery of a challenging and rewarding program of professional development and events.

Australasia has undoubtedly provided a dynamic and effective model for IAP2 that has ultimately resulted in a structural change to how the organisation runs. We have the largest membership in the world and are the fastest growing. We provide more training, train the trainers and events than any other part of IAP2. And on the Board we provide a dynamic, challenging and informed voice for the promotion of participation and the support of our membership.

There are currently four Australians on the Board of IAP2 – Desley Renton (President) and Professor Lyn Carson as elected members and Kimbra White and myself are nominated Affiliate representatives.

The International Board is an important part of our association. It has been a huge burden for Australian Board members to participate in face to face meetings, which they have largely had to pay for themselves. From next year, a new structure will result in a whole new Board with members from the UK, France and South Africa joining Canada, the US and Australasia. We look forward to creating an even better and more responsive membership focussed association for you over the coming years.

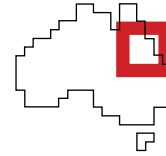

Queensland



Under the leadership of a new and enthusiastic Regional Coordinator, Queensland launched into the IAP2 year with pre-Christmas members networking events in Cairns, Brisbane and the Gold Coast. These small local events were followed by the Core Values Awards Winners Breakfast Showcase in Brisbane in June – an opportunity to acknowledge and learn from the Queensland-based winners of the 2009 Core Values Awards. Facing the challenge of a big and diverse state, the Queensland agenda has invested in getting to know the local members, understanding their needs, and looking to build a program of interest to them.

Queensland took on the challenge of running the IAP2 national event in 2010, hosting a 2-day forum and one day of masterclasses. Themed 'Engaging the Community in Changing Times', the event offered practitioners insightful professional development, with engaging speakers and innovative training opportunities. Our forum program targeted practitioners' needs as Queensland witnesses an unprecedented level of infrastructure investment. The workshop program offered practitioners unique opportunities for new training, including building expertise in facilitation, conflict management and effective communication, new tools models and case studies to evaluate engagement initiatives, and methods of applying technology in on-line and off-line environments.

Mid-year Queensland also hosted a breakfast showcasing 3 of the 5 Core Values award winners for 2009. Speakers from the Urban Land Development Authority, BBS and the Gold Coast City Council focused on masterplanning and visioning. The event highlighted the excellent standards of practice.

A distinctive networking experience was offered to our members who enjoyed a relaxed evening with like-minded colleagues. Stephani Roy McCallum international trainer in Emotion, Outrage and Public Participation hosted a dinner for members.

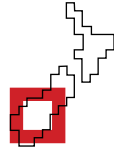
South Australia

As you can see it has been a busy year! Our small but dedicated team of volunteers have worked hard to ensure that there has been a full and interesting events calendar for all members.

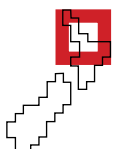

Training

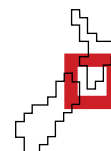
Two Certificate modules were held in Wellington with small numbers during the year, highlighting the need to better coordinate NZ training. A highlight was being able to 'sponsor' some community places on the courses which has been great PR for IAP2 amongst the community sector.

Leadership

We have taken the view that IAP2 has a wider role particularly in the capital city to raise PP issues and support initiatives. Two examples have been being involved in the organising group for a major Residents Conference held at Parliament in May, and facilitating a discussion between a group of senior practitioners and academics from the School of Government on the role of PP in government reform. We believe this advocacy role needs to grow as we position ourselves as a key group to be consulted on issues of public participation.

IAP2 Conference 2009 - it's a wrap!

This year's Australasian conference went off with a bang, attracting 185 delegates from a range of sectors across Australia and New Zealand. On 22 – 23 October 2009, they gathered at the Esplanade Hotel in Fremantle to 'tackle' their tough issues.

An inspiring and moving 'Welcome to Country' by Elder Noel Nannup really set the tone for the conference, and his sentiments were remembered by all.

The conference theme was Tackling the tough issues – engaging for results! Delegates had 16 breakout sessions and 13 picnic circles to choose from, with six keynote speakers. A smorgasbord of topics were on offer - engaging Indigenous communities, engaging for survival in Africa, engaging in times of fear and crisis, engaging governments; engaging communities affected

by infrastructure projects, engaging culturally and linguistically diverse communities and engaging online, through art and through performance, to name a few. The passion, commitment, honesty and inspiration of our keynote speakers and presenters was thoroughly enjoyed and appreciated.



Training 2009-2010

This year IAP2 Australasia put in place a new strategic plan that places training as a key strategy in improving the quality of the practice of community engagement and in supporting the development of our practitioners. IAP2's role is to understand the learning needs of its members and ensure that these needs are met through a range of training programs.

IAP2 has delivered the five day Certificate in Public Participation as a public program in most cities across Australia and New Zealand in 2009/2010 and as a pilot program to a small number of organisations. Almost 300 people have attended an IAP2 sponsored course this year.

A new internationally licensed course Emotion Outrage and Public Participation (EOP2) was developed and in October 2009, the International Association licensed four Australians to deliver this course. IAP2 Australasia has hosted the course during the financial year in Perth, Sydney, Adelaide and Auckland.

Another highlight of the year was hosting South African, Myrna Lewis who delivered her introductory and intermediate courses in Deep Democracy in Melbourne and Sydney.

IAP2 Australasia is committed to improving the content and delivery of all courses and is working with the International body to up-date the content of the Certificate Course and in Australasia in February 2010 we provided a two day professional development course for Australasian based trainers focusing on facilitation in a training setting.

I wish to thank the staff and trainers who have enabled and delivered a strong program of training this year. I am looking forward to extending the overall training program into wider subject areas in the forthcoming year and ensuring the delivery of new material to our members.

The picnic circles were a great way for people to continue learning and talking away from the conference venue in the fresh air and sun.

Part of the conference activities included the IAP2 Core Values Awards, held at the Moores Building Contemporary Art Gallery. The night was full of mingling, eating and drinking, and of course, the presentation of

the well-deserved awards. An amazing performance by dancer Justina Smith opened the official ceremony, which was ably hosted by Anne Pattillo, the IAP2 President. A fantastic night was had by all, some even managing to kick on to Little Creatures Brewery to ponder the day's events over a quiet ale.
